

Rev. Aaron Decker Leading Worship at Bethel

Sunday, June 30th, Rev. Aaron Decker will be preaching and presiding in worship at Bethel. Pastor Aaron has been working in our Companion Church, the Bolivian Evangelical Lutheran Church, for two and a half years as a theological educator. This work has included teaching and writing learning materials to educate local pastors and Sunday school teachers throughout the Bolivian Church—and of course, learning from them! Before going to Bolivia, he served congregations near Boston and Philadelphia, and was a lecturer in Old Testament and Malaysia Theological Seminary.

Bolivia is the second poorest nation in the Americas (after Haiti.) But despite few resources, it is probably the only Lutheran Church body in the Western hemisphere that is growing. Pastor Aaron will be sharing his experiences in Bolivia and ways that the church is bringing extraordinary resurrection to ordinary people's lives.

Who Can Donate

- Be in good general health and feeling well.
- Be at least 17 years old in most states (16 years old with parental consent in some states).
- Weigh at least 110 pounds. Additional weight requirements apply for donors 18 years old and younger and all high school donors.
- Have not donated blood in the last 56 days

What to Expect at My Donation

- 1. Register, show your ID and read some required information.
- 2. Health History and Mini-physical, answer some questions and receive a general health check.
- 3. The Donation, you will be seated comfortably while a pint of blood is drawn. This will take about 8-10 minutes.
- 4. Refresh and Recover, afterwards, you can enjoy a snack and drink for 10-15 minutes before resuming your day.

A Long Journey To A Short Walk With God

Recently. I was asked if I would be willing to share how I made the decision to apply for the LPA Program.

For as long as I can remember, I attended church every Sunday with ears and eyes open to listen and notice what was happening around me.

During my school years I was inspired and informed as I grew in my faith. I knew that after I graduated from High School that I wanted involvement in the life of God's Church. I have always been a spiritual person and wanted to, in some way, serve God. It was shortly after graduation Uncle Sam felt he needed me more than God did so I put my plans on hold and



enlisted in the United States Air Force to serve my country. While stationed here at Malmstrom I met Trudy and we were married.

After leaving the Air Force, I still felt committed to some sort of service work for others, so I took a job with the local utility (The Great Falls Gas Company.) My faith throughout continued to be important to me. Trudy and I became very active in volunteering at Bethel. I was aware of a desire to do more as far as ministry was concerned. Unfortunately, Trudy's illness began to restrict her involvement and I needed to spend more of my time with her. It was during this special time together she reminded me of how much I had enjoyed working alongside the elderly, the homebound, the recently bereaved and the sick. Always offering a friendly smile and a listening ear. It was from this desire to serve that she asked if I would consider becoming an LPA. It wasn't but a few weeks later she was in her heavenly home.

For the next six months I was lost until I found myself sitting around a table one Tuesday morning in the Fellowship Hall at Bethel. Men's Breakfast, a time of sharing, caring and fellowship was where God had placed me. It was during these Tuesday morning meetings that Trudy's request of becoming a LPA began to resurface again. After numerous comments from my brothers—in-faith about how I should use my gifts to serve my church community and to serve God through the work I was already doing. I knew that I must fulfill Trudy's wish. I came to the realization that God had been calling me all my life through all my life experiences. So what may seem like an all of a sudden decision was really a long preparation to serve.

In closing, I would like to encourage any other lay person to consider the LPA Program and join me as God Calls Us, God Transforms Us, God Sends Us.


Bethel Church Council Meeting Highlights

GOSPEL MESSAGE

All Are Welcome

Do you ever feel left out? Do you ever wonder if Jesus is really for you? Perhaps you wonder if your sins are too many, or too bad. Or perhaps life has dealt you a rotten hand, and if people only knew what was going




on behind your shallow "I'm fine" at church coffee hour, they wouldn't be so friendly. Or maybe you've heard that Jesus is for the marginalized, the victims, and the irreligious—and you're none of those things. You have a solid family, a good job, a nice church you're very involved in. *Perhaps Jesus is too busy to be bothered with my concerns*, you think.

If you've ever thought that perhaps you're not the right sort of person for the message of Jesus, today's gospel reading should set your mind at ease. In one quick story Jesus heals a woman of low status and the daughter of a man well respected in the community. The woman with the endless flow of blood shouldn't be near anyone, according to long-followed laws. But in faith, she dares to brush her fingers against the hem of Jesus' cloak and, instead of a rebuke, hears the loving voice of her Savior. The leader of the synagogue is precisely the sort of religious authority we tell ourselves Jesus came to cast down from their thrones. But in faith, he dares to ask Jesus into his home and, instead of a rebuke, sees the Messiah restore his daughter to life.

No matter who you are, Jesus is for you. Jew or Gentile, rich or poor, any gender, any background, marginalized or imbued with worldly power—Jesus is for you. He is not ashamed or afraid of you. He is not too busy helping others. Reach out in faith and let him show you just how much he loves you.
